

If approached by someone claiming official status

In accordance with NU Executive Memorandum 43:

Law enforcement needs a warrant to enter **private** spaces (private spaces include employee offices, classrooms, event meeting spaces (indoor or outdoor), and areas in County Extension buildings/offices where the public is not allowed to roam without permission or being accompanied. If the space is not open to the public, you do not have to allow entry without a warrant. If they would like to loiter in public spaces (e.g., waiting room; entry area) during regular hours when the building is open or outside of the building, they may do so, but they do not have the right to look around and talk to people without a warrant/subpoena.

- If U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)/law enforcement shows up with a warrant or alleges that they have one, **call** the local Police Department **and** Office of General Counsel (Bren Chambers: 402-472-1201/402-450-6014).
- Comply with the **warrant** and do not try to impede law enforcement officers (even if they do not have a warrant).
- If they do not have a **subpoena**, you are not obligated to talk to them/share information with them or submit to an interview (unless they are detaining you and reading the Miranda Rights).
